Nǐ Hǎo - 你好 (hello in Mandarin). We have a number of Chinese students from mainland China as well as Taiwan and Hong Kong.

Last year we were successful in gaining our Level 2 Accreditation. Since then our numbers have climbed steadily. This term we have 22 students at Cavendish Road, next term this will increase to 32. Term 4 will see us have 43 international students with a further 17 in High School Preparation (HSP).

Each school involved in the program has its numbers set to 10% of the Year 11 & 12 cohort. This means that we will not go beyond 50 students.

We have just finished hosting a study tour from Chubu in Japan. In August we will have Junten Super Science High School from Japan visiting for 2 weeks. Mr Steve Griffiths from Science has been busy organising the program. Mr Denner and Mr Griffith met with three teachers from Junten last week. They were excited with the program Mr Griffith has proposed.

Our sister school – Omiya Koryo will be visiting from 25 July – 3 August. Junten will be visiting from 17 – 29 August.

A very BIG THANK YOU to Annabelle Cooper (Senior International Prefect) and Barbara Simon (Junior International Prefect) to the wonderful work they have done throughout Term 1. They have helped our students make the transition to our school as well as helped enormously with the Chubu study tour.

Our Year 12's from last year did very well. Sherry Zhang obtained an OP2 and is studying Physiotherapy at Adelaide University. Jean Jang received an OP 5 and is studying at UQ. Mario Ding received an OP13 and is studying at the University of WA. Dilan obtained an OP13. He is currently working until he can return to Sri Lanka.

For teachers new to the school the International Program is made of a series of programs. The Graduate Program is for students who are here long term, usually until the end of Year 12. Study Abroad Program can be for 1 – 4 terms. We mostly receive students from Italy and Germany for this program and they usually commence in Term 3. Next term we will be having Matthias Zoll join us from Germany.

The International department also looks after the students who are here on a Dependant or Tourist Visa.

Homestay News from Lesley

Homestay Payments

You will have noticed by now that the homestay fee has been increased in 2015. The new weekly payment amount is \$263 per week. Payments are made one week in advance and one week in arrears. We are unable to process a payment for a student until they have actually moved in to their homestay. The payment is processed with the next fortnightly payment to our other homestay families. If this will cause you any difficulties please let me know in advance.

Homestay documentation

The Homestay Co-ordinator is required to keep a copy of the following documents and they must be up to date:

- The home and contents and legal liability policy of the homestay provider
- Both homestay parents current drivers licence
- A Risk Management Self -Assessment Form (the homestay provider is required to complete and submit a new form every 12 months)

If you have renewed your home and contents insurance policy or your driver's licence in the past 12 months (and you have not already given me a copy) could you please take a copy and send it in to me.

Population **1.4 billion** (19.24% of the world's population)



Size: 9,600,000 sq km

Location: Middle and East Asia bounded on the east by the Pacific Ocean

Climate: Mainly continental monsoon

Beijing (the Capital) has been populated for over 3,000 years. As at 2013 its population was 20.15 million.

Population: 47% of the population live in urban areas. The most populated city is Shanghai. Other major cities

include Chongqing, Shenzhen and Guanzhou.

- ☼ Table Tennis is the national sport.
- There is a bridge between mainland China and Macau that has cars switching from left hand to right hand drive and vice versa.
- In some parts of China sunrise may be as late of 10am as the country has combined 5 different time zones into one.
- The world's first paper money was created in China over 1,400 years ago.
- China uses 45 billion chopsticks per year
- The world's biggest mall is located in China and is 99% empty
- Beijing has been China's political centre for the last 800 years.
