# **Hong Kong**

Population 7.15 million



**Size**: 1104 sq km Less than 25% of the land is developed

**Location:** South Eastern Tip of China.

Climate: The climate is subtropical. Temperatures can drop to 10 degrees C in Winter and over 31 in Summer.

Victoria is the Capital.

#### **Interesting Facts**

- Currency is the Hong Kong Dollar.
- The name Hong Kong translates to "fragrant harbour" and is derived from 2 Chinese characters – Heung and Gong.
- With a population of more than 7 million occupying a small land mass makes it the most densely packed area in the world.
- Lucky numbers are 2, 3, 6, 8 and 9. Avoid the number 4 (it sounds like the word for death). 1 and 7 are also not liked!
- The Tsing Ma Bridge, which travellers pass by coming the airport to the city, is the world's longest road and rail suspension bridge.
- There are more skyscrapers in Hong Kong than in any other city in the world.
- There are over 8,000 buildings with 14+ floors. Almost twice the number found in New York.
- Seven out of 10 people take the bus while 35% take taxis every week.

- Hong Kong drives on the left unlike China which drives on the right.
- The flag of Hong Kong features a white, stylised, five-petal Hong Kong orchid tree flower in the centre of a red field. It was adopted on 4 April 1990.
- The Hong Kong flag was first officially hoisted on 1 July 1997 in the handover ceremony marking the transfer of sovereignty.
- Hong Kong is a Special Administrative Region of the People's Republic of China.
- It was under British rule from 1842 − 1997.
- Hong Kong's economy is characterised by free trade, low taxation.
- Sundays off and tend to get together to meet friends.
  Literally tens of thousands of maids gather in groups on the streets, beaches, and in parks.
  The nationalities never mix and there are customary areas for Filipinas,
  Indonesians, Nepalese, Thais etc.
- Hong Kong is famous for its midnight market. Situated in Temple Street, the market opens at 6pm and closes after midnight 7 days a week.
- Dai Pai Dongs are a fast food noodle shop found everywhere in Hong Kong. They are an inexpensive noodle store. The name means big signage stall which refers to the brash advertising signs used to attract customers.
- The Noon Gun is fired every day at Causeway Bay
